Firewise

On Monday 3rd November, students in Years 0-4 took part in the Firewise safety programme. Nick from FENZ, along with Glenorchy's own volunteer firefighters, Lindsay, Sonya, Danelle and Henry came and spoke to the children about fire safety. We covered the roles of firefighters, are matches and lighters tools or toys? and what to do in the event of a fire. Working smoke alarms was discussed and it is a reminder for parents at home to check your smoke alarms. Students will be coming home with a 'Get Firewise' booklet and a 'Our Safe Meeting Place' sticker today. We encourage you to read through the booklet with your whanau and on page 7 there is a grid where you can draw 'Our Escape Plan' for your home. Also, a 'Our safe Meeting Place' sticker can be placed at a designated meeting spot outside your home in the event of an emergency. We strongly suggest you take the time to discuss this with your whanau as it is fresh in their minds from our Firewise discussions.

Triathlon

The weather has disrupted some of our planned learning experiences over the last few weeks. We were fortunate to be able to participate in the Year 5 - Year 8 Small Schools Triathlon, but a decision was made to cancel both the Wakatipu and Central Otago events this year due to ground conditions.

BikeWise / Scooter Ready / Safe Walking

On Thursday 6 November, Constables Wayne Park and Amanda Shute, along with Lily and Matty from Good to Go, will be at school delivering the Safe Walking (New Entrant - Year 2), Scooter Ready (Year 3 and Year 4) and Bike Wise (Year 5 - Year 8) Programmes.

Students in Year 3 and Year 4 will need to bring their scooters and helmets to school. If you don't have a scooter, the team from Good to Go have a few that can be used. Please remember to bring along your helmet though!

The Year 5 - Year 8 students will also bike to the Hugo Bridge and back as part of the afternoon programme. Unfortunately we are unable to include our Year 1 - Year 4 students in the bike ride to the Hugo Bridge.

Wheels Wednesday will begin on Wednesday 12 November and will run each week for three Wednesdays. Students are able to bring their bikes and small wheels to school to play with at lunchtime. Senior students will set up courses on the tennis court and school field. Don't forget your helmets.

We want to share some insight into the complex and constant decision-making that takes place in your child's classroom every day. However, we ask that you trust your teacher's professional judgement. They are constantly using the best available evidence and their training to make responsive, high impact choices. Furthermore, our teachers frequently unpack decisions and concerns with other staff members to ensure consistency and gain diverse perspectives before finalising a significant decision. Ultimately, it is the classroom teacher who has the final say in making changes regarding their instruction and assessment, as they possess the most complete picture of all the factors influencing student learning in their specific context. We are partners in your child's education, and trusting our teachers' expertise ensures that your child is receiving the most appropriate and effective instruction possible.


