New Zealand's Treatment of Refugees – Time to Revisit?

New Zealand's treatment of refugees is the subject of Catalyst Trust's event this Saturday, featuring a local's documentary on the subject and talks by an Afghan refugee and refugee advocates.

Queenstowner Lucia Dore will show an abridged version of her documentary "Stepping Up," at The Rees Hotel Queenstown conference room on Saturday, at 5:30 p.m.. Registration is essential at <u>connect@catalystnz.org</u>

"New Zealand's intake of refugees, at 750, is tiny, compared with the rest of the world and hasn't changed for 25 years," said Ms Dore. "Could, and should, New Zealand, be doing more? Do we as a society gain by taking in refugees and asylum seekers?"

Ms Dore spent many years working as a journalist in the Middle East prior to producing her documentary on this globally divisive issue last year.

Also speaking at this Catalyst event will be:

Afghan refugee Gul Agha Alizadah, a Canterbury University student, is the son of one of the men who gained asylum under Helen Clark's government. He will explain the trauma his family suffered leaving Afghanistan and how they reached New Zealand.

Ahmed Tani, chair of Canterbury Refugee Council and acting chair of New Zealand National Refugee Network, works with refugees in Christchurch to help them integrate into NZ society. He will explain how refugees fared during the Christchurch earthquakes.
